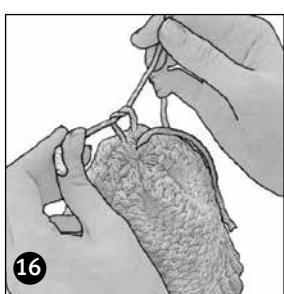
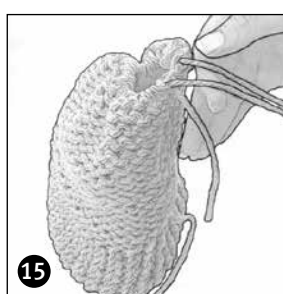
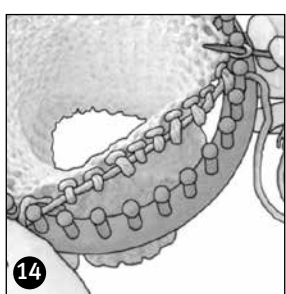
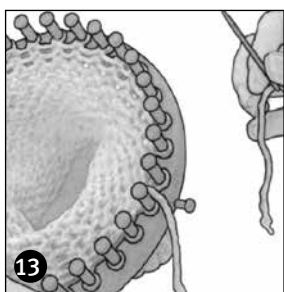
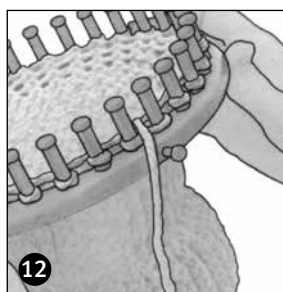
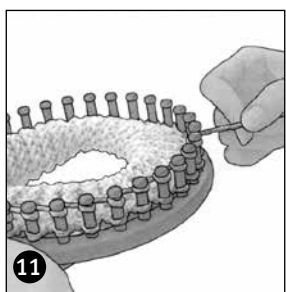
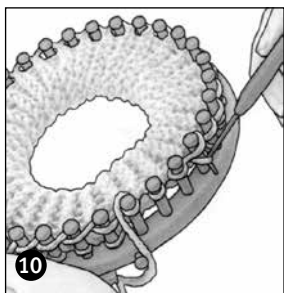
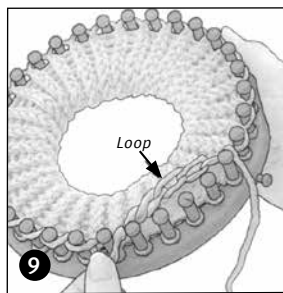
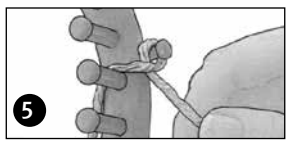
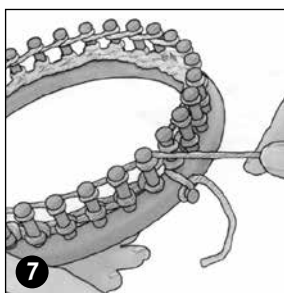
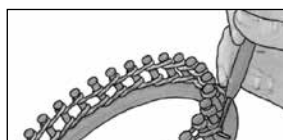
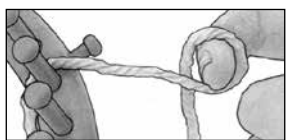
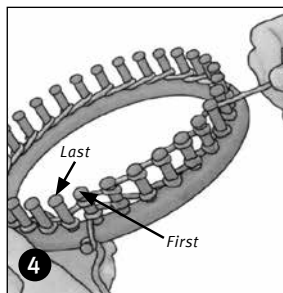
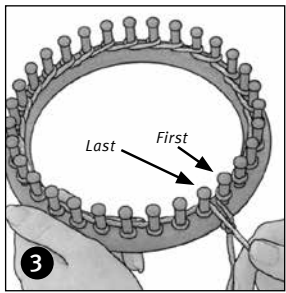
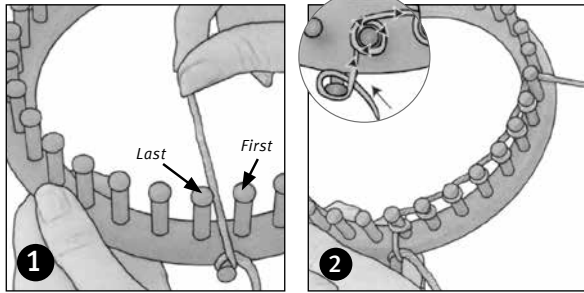


# Knitting with a round Quick Knit loom

Please note that you will also need a needle and a hook



*Quick Knit (Knifty Knitter) is a fun, clever knitting loom which allows you make beautiful scarves, beanies, bags and much more – without knitting a single stitch!*

Bear in mind that you should always work with loose yarn to ensure a soft, elastic result. For a fuller result, use thicker yarn and at least two strands. For the baby and child hats we recommend you use a thinner yarn. Do a test before starting on a larger project. Try mixing different types of yarn for a wonderful effect.

**How to make a beanie:**

1. Use double thread. Attach the two strands by winding them around the small peg on the edge. Pull the strands into the ring.
2. You will now begin the first circuit, going anti-clockwise. Wind the strands around the first peg, so the strands end up inside the ring again. Continue in the same way with the following peg until you have worked your way around the ring. Remember to weave the yarn loosely.
3. Push the yarn down to the bottom of the pegs.
4. Wind another circuit in the same way.
5. Attach the yarn again by tying it at the peg on the edge.
6. Now using a hook, lift the lower loop over the upper loop and off the peg. Start at the first peg and work your way around the loom. When you have finished you should have just one loop on each peg and you have knitted one circuit.
7. Knit another circuit by following steps 2–6.
8. Continue in this way until your project is the required length. When you have knitted several circuits you can undo the yarn tied to the edge peg and leave the yarn ends to hang loosely.

**To create a brim, follow steps 9–11:**

9. When you have knitted e.g. approx 8–13 cm check that you only have one row of loops on the pegs. Then bring the lower row of loops (the first row you knitted which is now hanging loose) in from the circle and thread the loops onto the opposite pegs. The loops will not line up exactly with the pegs, but just use the closest one and ensure only one loop goes on each peg. Continue all the way round until all loops are threaded on.
10. Use the hook to lift the lower loops over the top loops and off the pegs. Do the same all the way round.
11. Continue with steps 2–6 until the hat is the required size.

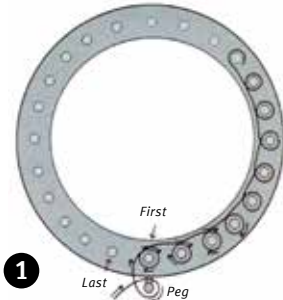
**How to finish off the beanie:**

12. When you have the required length, check that you only have one row of loops on the pegs. Leave a yarn length of approx 15 cm and cut.
13. Cut off 60 cm yarn and thread it double onto the needle.
14. Starting from the outside, thread the needle through the loop on the first peg. Lift off the loop. Working clockwise, continue around the loom until all the loops have been lifted off the pegs. Remove the needle and ensure the yarn ends are still sticking out from the first loop you thread through.
15. Turn the hat inside out and pull together with the yarn ends.
16. Tie together and attach the yarn ends. Attach all loose yarn ends and trim them.

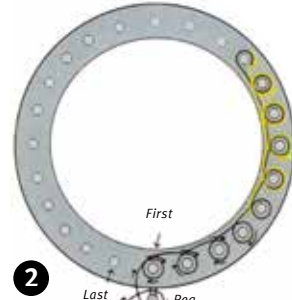
Turn the beanie the right way out. Decorate with a tassel or bobble if desired.



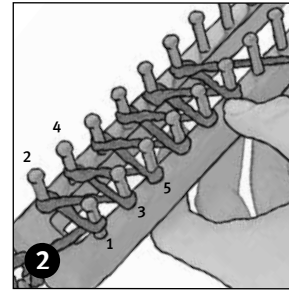
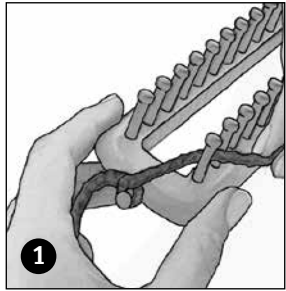
# How to make a scarf, belt or similar



1. Wrap the yarn once around the peg on the side of the loom. Then do one full wrap around the first peg and continue to wrap the yarn once around each peg until you have reached the width required. Turn back by wrapping the yarn around the next-to-last peg and work in the opposite direction back to the first peg. Fasten the yarn around the side peg with one wrap and follow step 6 from the beanie instructions. Continue to knit back and forth between the pegs until your scarf or belt is the required length. Note that you only knit off the outer loops every other row.



2. To knit off the whole piece, use the hook to lift the loop from the peg furthest from the yarn end. Lift off the next-to-last loop so you have two loops on your hook. Pull the second loop through the first. Lift off the third loop and pull it through the second. Continue like this until you pull the loose yarn end through the last loop. Fasten the yarn.



## Knitting with a rectangular Quick Knit loom

Always work with loose yarn for a soft and elastic result. For a fuller result use thicker yarn or at least two strands. Do a few tests before you start on the job proper. Mixing different yarns can produce beautiful effects.

### How to make one scarf or shawl:

1. It is usually best to knit with two strands of knitting yarn held together (treating them like one strand). Wrap the end of the yarn around the peg at the end of the loom.

2. Wrap the yarn from the inside of the first peg and around it once. Pull the yarn over to peg 2 on the opposite side. Wrap the yarn around peg 2 from the inside. Pull the yarn across the loom again to the third peg, and around the peg. Continue to wrap the yarn back and forth across the loom in a figure-of-8 pattern. Continue until you have wrapped the yarn around enough pegs to match the desired width of your project.

3. When you reach the last even-numbered peg, wrap it and then pull the yarn across the loom to the second-to-last peg.

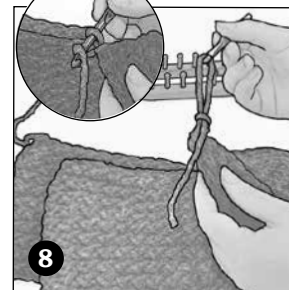
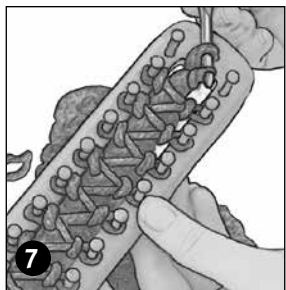
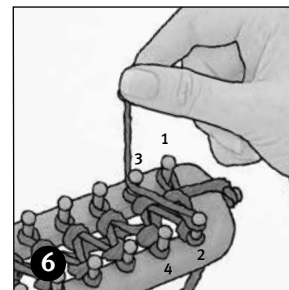
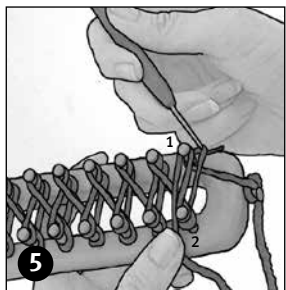
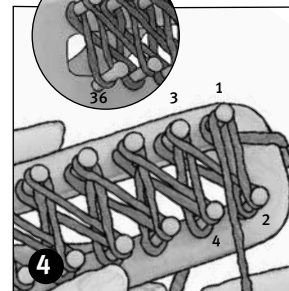
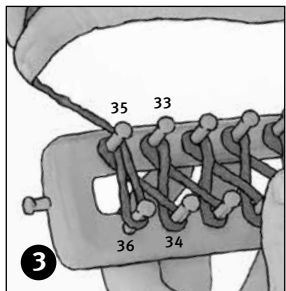
4. Wrap the yarn in a figure-of-8 pattern back across the loom until all pegs (except the last) have two wraps around them.

5. Hold the yarn in place with your thumb. Using the enclosed hook, lift the bottom yarn loop up over the top loop and off the peg. Continue using the hook to lift the bottom row of yarn loops over the top row and off each peg until there is only one loop on each peg.

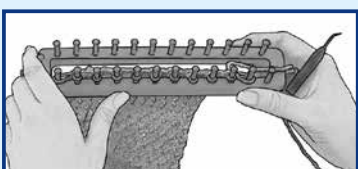
6. Wrap the yarn back across the loom in a figure-of-8 pattern to the last peg. Hold the yarn in place with your thumb while lifting the bottom yarn loop over the top one and off the peg, just as you did the first time around. Continue to wrap back and forth in this way until the project has reached the desired length. When you have knitted several rows you can remove the original end from the outside peg and let it hang.

7. To remove the yarn from the peg, first check that each peg has just one yarn loop. Cut the yarn approx 40 cm from the loom. Start at the last peg (the opposite end from where the yarn end is hanging) and, using the hook, lift the yarn loop off the peg. Lift the yarn loop off the next peg across the loom and pull the second loop through the first.

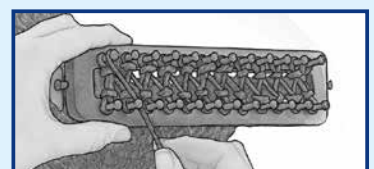
8. Continue to lift the yarn loop from the peg directly opposite through the previous one. After you have pulled the last hoop through, pull the yarn tail hanging from the end through the last hoop. Tie the yarn ends. Decorate the scarf/shawl with tassels or pom-poms.



Rectangular loom can be used to knit in two different methods:



Single knit



Double knit
